Ingleby Cross War Memorial

Research is being carried out into the Ingleby Cross War Memorial in order to update the existing records held by the Church. The plan is to publish the information on the village website later this year.

The names commemorated on the memorial are:

Captain Christopher York Pease, Yorkshire Hussars.
Sergeant Thomas Vasey Adamson, Yorkshire Regiment.
Private Edward Granger, Lincolnshire Regiment.
Private Albert Medd, 15 West Yorkshire Regiment.
William H Stockdale.

We are seeking more information about each soldier and their immediate family history. We would also like a portrait photograph of each soldier. We are especially keen to hear from relatives who are living in this area or further afield.

We would also like to see any photographs of the inscription on the side of the war memorial that faces Northallerton before it was refaced in the late 1990s due to having become badly weathered. The current inscription reads:

*"In memory of the Great War of 1914-1918 and
of the men of this village who fell in defence of
their country*

*Tell England ye who mark this monument
Faithfull to the end we rest content"*

Identity Fraud – Tips to help you keep safe

Have you received any emails supposedly from a financial institution regarding your account? Your bank or building society would not contact you in this way and invariably these are 'Phishing' emails designed to seek your identity for fraudulent purposes and often include an attachment or a link to a website. Good advice is to delete these without opening any attachments or clicking onto the link.

However a better way is to report the fraud so that it can be dealt with and any perpetrators found.

The UK's National Fraud and Internet Reporting Centre can be contacted on 0300 123 2040 or by visiting www.actionfraud.police.uk.

There are a few simple questions to answer regarding the nature of the phishing email followed by an address that you can forward the email to where it can be dealt with. For example, in my own case, just recently I have received contact supposedly from Amazon regarding tracking of an order (which I hadn't made). It provided a link for me to access details of the order. I reported this via the Action Fraud website and at the end of the report I was provided with a contact address for Amazon's dedicated internet fraud section. Similarly I have had emails from 'Barclays' asking me to verify my personal details as there was a problem with my account. These phishing emails are taken very seriously by banks etc. and your report could help with a conviction, so it is important to take the time to report them.

There seems to be an increase in this sort of contact and security of your personal information is vital. Please be vigilant and safeguard your details. Good practice taken from the Action Fraud website is

- **Many frauds start with a phishing email.** Remember that banks and financial institutions will not send you an email asking you to click on a link and confirm your bank details. Do not trust such emails, even if they look genuine. You can always call your bank using the phone number on a genuine piece of correspondence, website (typed directly into the address bar) or the phone book to check if you're not sure.
- Shred, burn or otherwise obliterate any personal data printed on correspondence before disposing of it. Do not put bank statements and other sensitive documents in the recycling bag. Identity fraudsters don't need much information in order to be able to clone your identity.
- If you do have to 'bin it', tear up the paper so that your details are destroyed and then share the scraps of paper between a few waste paper bags so that it cannot be re-assembled.

- **Do not give any personal information** (name, address, bank details, email or phone number) to organisations or people before verifying their credentials.
- **Make sure your computer has up-to-date anti-virus software** and a firewall installed. Ensure your browser is set to the highest level of security notification and monitoring to prevent malware issues and computer crimes.
- **Sign-up to “Verified by Visa” or “MasterCard Secure Code” whenever you are given the option** while shopping online.

This involves you registering a password with your card company and in this way adds an additional layer of security to online transactions with signed-up retailers.

- **If you receive bills, invoices or receipts for things you haven’t bought, or financial institutions you don’t normally deal with contact you about outstanding debts, take action.** Your identity may have been stolen.
- **Be extremely wary of post, phone calls or emails offering you business deals out of the blue.** If an offer seems too good to be true, it probably is. Always question it.
- **If you have been a victim of fraud, be aware of fraud recovery fraud.** This is when fraudsters pretend to be a lawyer or a law enforcement officer and tell you they can help you recover the money you’ve already lost.
- **If you need advice about fraud, call Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 to discuss your situation with one of their specialist fraud advisers.** To report a fraud, you can either use the **online fraud reporting form** or make your report by calling **0300 123 2040**.

Neighbourhood Watch

Door to door sellers: It is not an offence to cold call, or to cold call in a No Cold Calling Zone (NCCZ), although repeated calls at the same property might constitute an offence of harassment. What the NCCZ does do is to give a very clear statement that door to door callers are not wanted in that designated area. Politely say to callers that they are in a NCCZ and you do not wish to use their services, and close the door without conversing with them. Then report them. The Police will usually be able to provide a quicker response (depending on current priorities and tasking) so telephone them first on 101. The information will soon reach Trading Standards who check the Police logs daily for doorstep crime and reports of door to door selling. Trading Standards will then contact the company, reminding them that they have been operating in a NCCZ (if applicable) and asking them not to call again in that area.

General thefts: Burglaries of outbuildings and garages are continuing in rural areas with quad bikes, motorbikes and power tools being targeted. The Police are conducting vigorous patrols across our borders and in rural communities to combat this crime, and request everybody to be vigilant of your and your neighbours' properties. If you see anything suspicious please report it immediately to North Yorkshire Police on 101. Please ensure that any outbuildings are securely locked with windows covered to prevent potential offenders being able to see in and note anything of value that they may wish to steal.

This service only takes 30 minutes from Stokesley to Middlesbrough compared with an hour on the Arriva Service 29.
