Neighbourhood Watch

Most criminals are opportunists and don't like to be seen or identified. Make sure your house is well lit when you are out. Outside lights should be left on and timer switches used for indoor lighting.

Tell your neighbours if you are going away to enable them to keep an eye on your property and report any suspicious activity.

Where possible prevent any unauthorised access to the rear of your property by locking garden gates.

Please advise any elderly neighbours not to open their doors to callers unless they know who is at their door.

Keep sheds and outbuildings locked and don't leave valuables on display. Blank out or curtain any windows to prevent people seeing inside.

Battery operated shed alarms can be purchased from Community Safety at Hambleton District Council for approximately £15. Shed bars can be purchased for a reasonable price (for example, see www.dgsecurity.co.uk).

Never leave valuables on open view in an unattended vehicle and always lock your vehicle when it is unattended.

Advance notice has been given to launch the new national nonemergency telephone number for the Police service in England and Wales. The plan is that 101 will be accessible by communities across North Yorkshire and the City of York from 12 December 2011. The current 0845 6060247 number will continue to be in place and will be gradually phased out. Calls to 101 will cost 15 pence per call, regardless of the duration, and this applies to landlines and mobile phones. More details are at <u>www.police.uk/101</u>
